

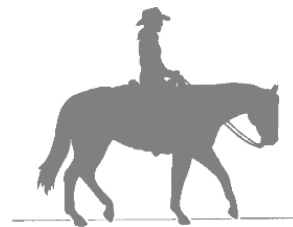

## WESTERN COACH 2 PROGRAM

### PREREQUISITES

Candidates **must** have completed the following prerequisites **prior to applying** for the Coach 2 Assessment:

- 1) Current OEF Membership
- 2) Current Equine Canada Gold (at minimum) Sport License
- 3) Intermediate Rider Program (General + Specialization Components)
- 4) Proof of competitive experience
- 5) Proof of training experience
- 6) Proof of coaching experience
- 7) Current First Aid Certificate
- 8) *NCCP Multi-Sport Part A Certificate of Completion* **and** *Equine Canada Learn to Teach Course* (if not completed for Coach 1) **OR** *new NCCP/Equine Canada Equestrian Specific Training Workshop*
- 9) NCCP Multi-Sport Part B.
- 10) Completed Western Coach 2 Mentor Program
- 11) Signed EC Coaching Code of Ethics and Code of Conduct (if not completed for Coach 1)
- 12) Signed Acceptance of Risk Form

### SPECIALIZATIONS

The candidate may choose one or more of the three following specializations: Reining, General Performance or Speed Events. In order to be eligible, candidates are required to pass the EC Intermediate General Component certificate and the Intermediate Riders exams related to the candidate's specialization. Those specializations are as follows:

REINING	GENERAL PERFORMANCE	SPEED EVENTS
Reining	Showmanship Horsemanship Western Pleasure Trail	Barrel racing Pole bending

### ELIGIBILITY

- ♦ be at least 20 years old
- ♦ be an active member of the OEF
- ♦ have a current EC Gold Sport Licence.
- ♦ have obtained their EC Western Coach Level 1 Certificate (for a minimum 2 years)
- ♦ have at least two years coaching experience
- ♦ have completed the EC Western Intermediate General Component along with all the disciplines of the intermediate rider program related to their specialization (General Performance, Speed Events, Reining)

- ♦ hold a current First Aid Certificate
- ♦ have completed the required NCCP theory courses as outlined above
- ♦ Supply a summary\*\* of their competition experience in one or many of the following fields:
  - Preparing riders for competition
  - Preparing horses for competition
  - Any personal competition experience.

**\*\*Summary** must include following information:

- Riders's name, horse's name, name and date of the competition
  - competition level (regional, provincial, national)
  - event, number of participants, standing
- ♦ present a training plan of both horse and rider for one competition season, in accordance with the level two theory course. This plan has to be submitted 30 days prior to the exam to the OEF.

Full registration refunds will be provided for written cancellations received prior to 30-days before the Assessment; a 25% administration fee will be applied to refunds requested after that date, however, NO REFUNDS will be granted less than 14-days prior to the date of the Assessment or for no-shows. The OEF reserves the right to cancel session(s) due to unforeseen circumstances or insufficient advance registration. The OEF cannot accept responsibility for expenses incurred as a result of the cancellation of an Assessment.

### PRACTICAL COACHING ASSESSMENT OUTLINE

The EC Intermediate Rider Course Manual, EC Level 2 Western Coaching Manual and the EC Stable Management in Canada Manual are essential reference tools for the candidate' s preparation.

For each of the fields to which the candidate is registered, it is the candidate's responsibility to have:

- . a student able to render a presentation in the evaluated field. Possibility of more than one student if registered to more than one field of specialization.
- . a horse trained to the level corresponding to the requirements of evaluated field
- . the necessary equipment for rider and horse's preparation

For each of the fields presented by candidate, the evaluation relies on the four following elements:

- . horse's evaluation

- . coaching a student
- . correcting a performance problem of either horse and/or rider
- . oral exam

## **1. Horse's evaluation**

The candidate mounts and demonstrates the qualities and points to be improved by the horse used by his student in the presentation (the analysis of the horse's confirmation will take place in halter on the ground). The candidate must present all manoeuvres used in the pattern. The warm-up may be ridden in two-hands, but once warmed up, the coach must demonstrate the movements in one-hand. A discussion between examiners and the candidate on this analysis will follow ( +/- 10 minutes and +/- 20 minutes for reining).

Evaluated items:

- warm up
- appropriate work
- effectiveness of candidate as a rider
- quality of horse's analysis by the candidate
- communication skills of candidate with examiners

## **2. Coaching a student**

The candidate prepares their student for their presentation ( 10-15 min. coaching, review of the course and difficulties encountered, practice of part of the course and of complete course). The student must proceed to a demonstration of the discipline, candidate must analyse the student's performance. The candidate coach must prepare their student to ride in a competition, watch the student run through the pattern(s), evaluate the student's performance and give comments to the student on their performance, what to work on, etc.

Evaluated items:

- candidate's voice
- enthusiasm
- lesson structure
- ability to recognize mistakes

## **3. Correction of a problem on horse and/or student performance**

After analysis of student and horse performance in the presentation, the examiners will ask the candidate to give certain adjustments to student and/or horse. Demonstration of this must reach aimed objectives.

Evaluated items :

- voice
- enthusiasm
- message transfer ability
- use of acceptable training techniques
- effectiveness

## **4. Oral exam**

A meeting between candidate and examiners permits the evaluation of his knowledge in the field of stable management (feeding, shoeing, defects and lameness, etc.). Usually a minimum of 10 questions are asked.

If same horse is used in the presentations of two consecutive fields requiring considerable physical efforts (ex: barrels and pole bending), the examiners will allow a 30 minutes recovery period for the horse between the two disciplines.

## **RESULTS**

The candidate is informed of their results on the same day and will be given a summary of the exam. In order to pass the exam, the candidate must meet the minimum standards for each portion of the exam.

Any candidate who receives an approaching standard on one or more sections may apply after 30 days to retake the Assessment within two (2) years from the date of the Assessment. If more than two (2) years has lapsed, the candidate must retake the entire Assessment.

## **GENERAL INFORMATION**

### **Dress code**

The candidate must report with proper clothes, in accordance with the requirements of western riding (including boots and hat)

### **Equipment**

Grooming kit, Halter, lead rope (with or without chain)

Boots and exercise bandages

Saddle blanket, underblanket, saddle, bridle

Paper and pen

Tack must be clean, well adjusted and in good order. It has to be in accordance with the western rule book of Equine Canada, according to each discipline.

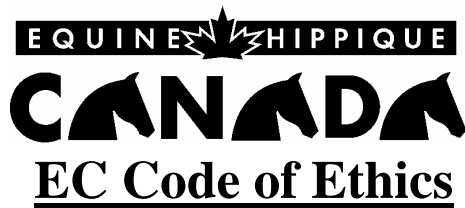
### **Horse**

Horses used for evaluation must be in good shape, clean and well presented. It's the responsibility of each candidate to make sure they have access to a horse able to meet the requirements of the evaluation. The candidate can bring his own horse or rent one.

## **REGISTRATION**

Each registration must be received at the OEF at least 30 days before date set for the event.

\*Do not forget to supply the summary of your experience in competition.

### **Preamble**

We believe:

that equestrian sport is based on a partnership between horse and human athlete;

that it is the right and responsibility of Equine Canada to set standards in matters of ethics, sportsmanship and the welfare of the horse and in all matters under its jurisdiction;

that it is desirable to define ethical practices, to delineate unethical practices, to encourage good sportsmanship, fair play and high ethical behavior and to warn, censure, or bring to public attention and discipline those who commit acts detrimental to the best interests of stakeholders;

that EC members should observe the spirit as well as the letter of this Code of Ethics;

that membership is a privilege, not a right and that membership may be suspended, terminated or rejected following appropriate disciplinary procedures.

### **Application and Structure of the Code of Ethics**

1. All members of the EC (including temporary members) shall be bound by this Code of Ethics.
2. All members of other National and Provincial Federations must agree to be bound by the rules of the EC while competing or exhibiting at EC sanctioned competitions.
3. The Code of Ethics consists of four parts: The Preamble, the Statement of Principle, the Code of Conduct and Further Expectations of a EC member. The Statement of Principle is to be considered an interpretive guide in applying the Code of Conduct. The Code of Conduct is mandatory in character and is enforceable.

### **Statement of Principle**

Equine Canada (EC), the national equestrian federation of Canada, supports adherence to humane treatment of horses in all competitions under its jurisdiction.

EC is committed to:

Upholding the welfare of horses, regardless of value, as a primary consideration in all activities;

Requiring that horses be treated with kindness, respect, and the compassion that they deserve, and that they never be subjected to mistreatment;

Ensuring that owners, trainers and exhibitors or their agents use responsible care in the handling, treatment and transportation of their horses as well as horses placed in their care for any purpose;

Providing for the continuous well-being of horses by encouraging routine inspection and consultation with health care professionals and competition officials to achieve the highest possible standards of nutrition, health, comfort, sanitation and safety as a matter of standard operating procedure;

Continuing to support scientific studies on equine health and welfare;

Increasing education in training and horsemanship practices;  
Requiring owners, trainers and exhibitors to know and follow their sanctioning organization's rules, and to work within industry regulations in all equestrian competition;

Reviewing, revising and developing competition rules and regulations that protect the welfare of horses.

The standard by which conduct or treatment will be measured is that which a reasonable person, informed and experienced in generally accepted equine training and exhibition procedures, would determine to be neither cruel, abusive nor inhumane.

### **Code of Conduct**

EC rules address the following general areas:

- welfare of the horse
- safety of horse and human athlete
- administration of competitions
- code of conduct for officials and competitors
- drug and medication control
- individual breed and discipline rules

1. All EC members shall support the enforcement of the rules of the Federation by:

- a) personal knowledge and compliance
- b) agreeing to report any alleged infractions and occasions of alleged abuse

2. The organizers of EC sanctioned competitions shall operate within the rules of the Federation.

3. A member should be completely trustworthy, exhibit honesty, loyalty and discretion in all equestrian related activities.

4. A member should issue public statements only in an objective and truthful manner

5. The EC member should uphold issues of safety and fairness in all aspects of equestrian sport.

6. No member shall act to the detriment of others or equestrian sport in a situation where the responsibility of their position places them in a conflict of interest.

7. All members shall conduct themselves in a manner which reflects the values and ethics of EC. Any member who engages in or is party to conduct inappropriate to an EC member will be subject, after due process, to such sanctions as the Federation may impose.

### **Further Expectations of an EC Member**

1. Members are encouraged to continuously educate themselves and to take an active role in the activities of the Federation.

2. The EC member should strive to preserve and enhance the image of the sport so that society's respect will be maintained.

### **THE EYES OF THE WORLD ARE ON YOU!**

This is a reminder to all Coaches/Course Conductors of their responsibilities to the program and the public.

1. You have a responsibility to the national coaching program to maintain its standards and credibility.
2. You have a responsibility to each and every student/candidate to offer them every opportunity to present their knowledge and expertise to you.

### **WHAT DOES THIS MEAN TO YOU?**

1. Continue to educate and keep yourself current with policy.
2. Be positive and professional in your attitude and performance at all times, whether in private or public; a lesson, a show or an exam. "Your image stays with you."
3. Remember, as a recognized Coach/Course Conductor, you constantly represent our coaching program. THIS IS AN HONOUR, NOT A GUARANTEED RIGHT.
4. You expect the student/candidate to present him or herself in a well turned-out manner. You should do the same – practical, business-like clothing for Evaluations/Exams.
5. You expect the candidates to be positive and relaxed in their manner – return the favour. Never let the candidate receive any negative feedback from you in verbal or visual form. Body language can say more than you want it to.
6. Remember that you must be able to justify to the 'nth' degree any written or verbal comment you make. Maintain and retain accurate records!
7. Be organized and on time! There is nothing worse for the students/candidates or other Course Conductors than having to wait for someone who is inefficient.
8. You are conducting an Exam or Evaluation to evaluate performance, not to give out 'personal' ideas or viewpoints.
9. Remember that our program can succeed or fail on your public relations alone.
10. Negotiate goodwill with all concerned, from the candidates, to the facility owner/manager, to the local coordinator, to the barn help and to the youngster who brings you the coffee or juice.

In all, this job truly has many rewards for those who face it with a positive and professional manner.

- The propensity of any equine to behave in ways that might result in injury, harm or death to persons on or around them and to potentially collide with, bite or kick other animals, people, or objects.
  - The unpredictability of an equine’s reaction to such things as sounds, sudden movement, tremors, vibrations, unfamiliar objects, persons or other animals and hazards such as subsurface objects.
  - The potential for other participant (s) to act in a negligent manner that might contribute to injury to themselves or others, such as failing to act within their ability or to maintain control over an equine.
- \_\_\_\_ 3. **I Freely Accept and Fully Assume All Responsibility** for the Inherent “**RISKS**” and the possibility of personal injury, death, property damage or loss resulting from my Participation in Equine Activities.
- \_\_\_\_ 4. **I Acknowledge** that it remains my **Sole Responsibility** to act in such a manner as to be responsible for my own safety and to Participate Within My Own Limits.
- \_\_\_\_ 5. **In addition to consideration given for my Participate in Equine Activity, I and my heirs, executors, administrators and assigns (collectively called my “Legal Representatives”)** agree
- **To Waive All Claims that I might have against the “HOST”;** and
  - **To Release the “HOST” from Any and All Liability** for any loss, damages, injury, or expense that I or my “Legal Representatives” might suffer as a result of my Participation due to any cause whatsoever **including any NEGLIGENCE ON THE PART OF THE “HOST”;** and
  - **To HOLD HARMLESS AND INDEMNIFY THE “HOST”** from any and all liability for property damage or personal injury to any third party which might result from my Participation in Equine Activities.
